Playing Offense in Love by Fred Kirchenwitz, Head of Elders

Be Watchful, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love. - 1 Corinthians 16: 13-14

In the above scripture verses, Paul is addressing the congregational leaders of the church at Corinth who happen to be men. He wanted them to display manly virtues, "IN LOVE!" The Lutheran Study Bible goes on to say that, " the virtue of strength does not conflict with the virtue of love." In other words, strength and love should be in harmony with one another and not discord.

The reason I began my letter like this is because at February's Voters meeting, Pastor Koepsell quoted me as saying we should start "playing offense in love." To better explain what I meant, I think some context is in order. In a previous council meeting, we were reviewing the needs assessment survey that the congregation filled out. Number 3 on the prioritized list of needs was visiting delinquent members. My first comment was that we need a better definition of delinquent and that it always feels as though we are playing defense. Whether that means making excuses for why people aren't here; trying to accommodate everyone according to what the secular world views as important; or simply not setting our expectations high enough. I'd like to address each of these items with examples.

I realize that the world is a busy place, tugging all of us in different directions. After working for UPS for 30 years, I definitely developed a sense of urgency. Thinking ahead, how to multi-task, making every second productive, and that tends to wear on you! I feel this is especially difficult on our kids, whether it's sports, dance, music, theater, debate etc.... I played sports in high school and college. I went through it with my kids and I can't imagine it's gotten any easier in the past 10-15 years. In all the different things I listed you are expected to be there on time, all the time and to participate. That doesn't even take into account the financial cost. If you don't, they'll find someone else who will. Now obviously a church doesn't operate like that, but what if we set our expectations a little higher? Expect catechism students to treat this class with the same importance (or preferably more) as any other weekday class! Expect parents to help with memory work and take them to church regularly! We did something as simple as make an acolyte schedule for the 3 confirmation classes and the response has been awesome! They communicate with one another and it gets done. Just a couple of examples of playing offense in love!

As Elders when we visit members we haven't seen in a while, they will tell us that they haven't been making church a priority. Sometimes this is an excuse or possibly code for a bigger problem that's going on with them or their household. This is a perfect opportunity for some offense in love! Sanctuary is not only the house where we worship, but can be defined as "place of refuge or safety." Relationship problems, depression, job loss, illnesses or whatever burden you are carrying, know that God's house is the first place you want to be! Not a last resort.

John 15: 12-13, " This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends."

As this Parish Pulse comes out, we just finished the season of Lent and celebrated Holy Week where Christ, who is love incarnate, did exactly what He said He would do. As mortal Christians, we can never make that type of sacrifice, but we can play a little less defense and a little more offense. ALWAYS in LOVE!



Ascension Day is an important Christian holiday that marks the conclusion of the earthly ministry of Jesus Christ and his ascension into heaven. Observed 40 days after Easter Sunday, Ascension Day commemorates the moment when Jesus, after his resurrection, ascended into the clouds before the eyes of his Disciples. Various Christian denominations around the world recognize this event, each with unique customs and traditions.

According to the New Testament, Jesus appeared to his Disciples several times over 40 days after his resurrection, teaching them about the Kingdom of God. On the 40th day, Jesus led his Disciples to the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, where he blessed them before rising to the heavens. The Acts of the Apostles (Acts 1:9-11) and the Gospel of Luke (Luke 24:50-53) detail this event, emphasizing the importance of Jesus' ascension and the promise of His return.

The ascension of Jesus serves as a symbol of hope and assurance for Christians, as it signifies the completion of Jesus' earthly mission and the beginning of His heavenly reign. Board of Elders

As with all church boards, the Elders are required to submit a year-end report detailing our different endeavors or tasks that we hoped or hoped to accomplish. Seems like an easy enough job, doesn't it? Give the congregation a laundry list of what we did. Give ourselves a pat on the back and move on to 2024, clean and simple. Or is it?

Truth be told, a lot of what we do goes unnoticed. We are usually the first to get to church and the last to leave always making sure things run smoothly. When members arrive, they receive a bulletin, enjoy some fellowship and proceed to take part in the worship service. We attempt to do that as well, all the while keeping an eye on Pastor Koepsell, taking the count, securing the offerings, changing the hymn boards, helping serve and clean up communion etc...... I'm not explaining this to toot our own horns, but instead to emphasize there's more to the Elder group than lighting the candles and ringing the bell. These tasks are not exciting or glamorous, but they are necessary! We take pride in doing them and this is our service in love to Him who first loved us.

At this time of year, the offering envelopes are available for pick up in the atrium. We usually give members the month of January before we take stock of who hasn't picked theirs up. This will then tie into church attendance and along with the data from the kiosks, give us a good idea of the specific members we need to contact. We make every effort to not just get them their envelopes, but to find out why their attendance is lacking and if all is ok in their lives. There is a constitutional process we went through a few years ago where letters were sent out to members we visited or were unable to contact over the course of the year. This is something we may have to look into again in 2024.

In June of 2023 we conducted CPR training and learned how to use the defibrillator. About 20 members attended besides the Elders so we increased the number of people who can help in case that emergency situation arises. A special thank you to Heather Klauer for leading us through it, as well as Todd for supplying the mannequins for us to work on.

Our duties/goals are pretty much in the church constitution, but if I had to summarize them into a single word, it would be SERVE!

- 1. Serve our church: making sure the service is reverent and sacred, the sacraments are administered, and the Word is preached.
- 2. Serve our members: in kindness, gentleness, humility and love
- 3. Serve our pastor: assisting him in any and all ways needed

Board of Trustee

We coasted through 2023 without any budget busting maintenance catastrophes or unexpected major expenses. Several large (expensive) budgeted projects were completed or are in the schedule. One of these was re-lamping the sanctuary area as some members expressed difficulty reading when we had low sun light conditions. Another is painting of the sanctuary walls, which is scheduled to be done after Epiphany. We had some difficulty finding a contractor and then our schedules dictated that it had to wait until the Christmas decorations were taken down. One window in the sanctuary remains that needs the opener crank replaced which is somewhat involved and expensive to repair, this will be addressed when the weather warms up this spring.

We expect repair expenses will continue to be larger in the future than they have been in past years given the age of our building and infrastructure. As examples we had three water heaters that had to be replaced (two in the basement and one in the sacristy) and the refrigerator in the kitchen needed repair. These types of issues are not predictable and never ending, not tragedies just inconveniences. We also know that two air-conditioning units will probably need replacement as they were not working efficiently last fall and they both use obsolete refrigerant.

With winter on us, the parking lot snow removal contract is taken care of using the contractor from previous years. Sidewalk snow removal is accomplished by volunteers; there is a signup sheet in the narthex. As always there is an ongoing need for volunteers for snow blowing and lawn care. Volunteers are the lifeblood of a functioning church. Without them our earthly life would be much more expensive. We enjoy the services of many good volunteers, but we can always use more.

Going forward in 2024 we have a list of expensive "want to have" projects. This includes moving the garage to make it more serviceable and upgrading the parking lot lighting. We will have to wait and see how well the budget will stand up to some of these projects and prioritize them as we get into the New Year.

Within the last month, we were able to go on a mission trip to Downtown Chicago through our school, Valley Christian School. We were able to in part because of your generosity. Whether it was through buying items we made for the Craft Fair or prayer, you helped support us on this trip. We feel so blessed to have a congregation that helps support us and are extremely grateful for all that you have done so we could go and share Christ in Chicago.

Over the five days we spent in Chicago, our team of 19 students and two chaperones had the opportunity to work with an organization called Jesus People. They work with lower income and homeless people by providing them clothing, food, and housing.

We worked at their store which offers people of lower income with clothing for free. We were able to help the one volunteer who ran the place. The amount of work we accomplished during our time there would have taken the lone volunteer weeks, if not months to accomplish. This store is located on the 5th floor of a building and every single bag of donations had to be carried up several flights of stairs. We carried up bags of donations and helped sort clothes into storage or hung them up in the store. The woman who we worked with was wonderful and taught us lessons about the value of patience and hard work.

We also had the opportunity to help prepare and serve food in the Jesus People soup kitchen. This was a blessing because their soup kitchen serves many people and it can be hard to prepare enough food. We got to talk to the people who we served food too. Some of our team members had really good conversations with people.

We had downtime before and after we worked at the store and soup kitchen. This was a really good time to build relationships with our fellow team members. We had morning devotions with small groups, and a worship time to end our days, as well as time to debrief about the day. This was enjoyable because we were able to grow closer to God and our team.

This mission trip stretched people out of their comfort zone and helped them to strengthen their God-given talents, but also expanded our views of the world we live in.

We had the opportunity to eat at a Thai restaurant and see the incredible ethnic diversity as we walked around downtown Chicago. We could see it represented in murals, restaurants, and the people we met. It was truly wonderful to be able to get a glimpse of different cultures meeting in one area.

Overall, it was a great experience and we definitely both felt closer to God afterwards. We are truly grateful for all the memories we were able to make and the experiences we had. Once again, we thank you for all your support and prayers.

Your Gift That Keeps Giving

Dear members and guests of Good Shepherd,

A funny thing happened to me this winter. I was getting undressed one evening and, to my great and humiliating surprise, I popped the button off my pants. Now, threads get old; fabric tears. This, unfortunately, was on a pair of jeans. I've been on the earth long enough to know that a thing like this is rare. One might expect such an occurrence late in the afternoon on Thanksgiving Day, where one's eating companions might offer a knowing chuckle, but not on an ordinary evening.

Now, this story isn't about my extraordinary powers of expansion, but about what I did, or didn't do, next. The next morning, I couldn't find any of the other jeans I thought I had. Not really wanting to wear dress slacks, I put my jeans back on and carefully slipped the button back into its place. I found that if I applied enough pressure, the jeans would hold. Knowing this wouldn't be a problem I went about my day. In fact, I kept this up for a few days.

As the days wore on, though, the tear in my jeans got progressively worse. Pretty soon, my cobbled-together pants were struggling to stay on. I finally broke down and did the thing I least wanted to do: go clothes shopping.

I had the opportunity to share this story with sixty-five counselors in March at Focus on the Family. I was in Colorado for a site visit for our upcoming Summit in May and was invited to share some thoughts with a monthly gathering of Christian therapists that meets there. The point I made with the counselors was one with which they were all too familiar. Rather than take immediate action to fix my problem, I allowed it to linger on, getting progressively worse. I went shopping only when my situation was no longer tenable.

The late psychologist Edwin Friedman observed in A Failure of Nerve that people quite often are willing to endure chronic, albeit lesser, pain rather than endure the temporary, but more acute, pain of fixing the issue. Don't you find this to be true? We struggle through a sore joint for a long time before scheduling an appointment with the doctor. We let our resentments simmer rather than engage in the difficult task of reconciliation. This is certainly true for any hidden or shameful sin we may be struggling with. The fear of being known in our weakness keeps us hidden in the shadows, like our first parents.

This is how our broader society tends to operate as well. Government officials often ignore a problem until their constituents threaten to remove them from office. (Which might be preferable to those officials always looking for problems to solve that might be best left alone.) One example of this is how long it takes to fix most potholes.

Sadly, when it comes to helping parishioners navigate this sexually explicit and confusing culture, far too many churches remain hidden and silent rather than taking the difficult, but essential, step of openly addressing these challenging issues. There are many reasons for this—even good ones—but the fact is that many faithful Christians have been formed more by the world than the Word.

Since 2017, Sexual Integrity Leaders (formerly Brushfires Foundation) has narrowed its focus to helping churches and Christian leaders overcome hurdles to preaching the full Gospel of Jesus, especially as it relates to sexuality and human identity. This year's Summit is exploring the challenge of creating a culture of encounter. That is, how do our churches become places where people become comfortable and safe enough to come out of the personal shadows? More than that, how do we become a people that goes out into the highways and byways, looking for people to invite to the banquet of our Lord?


There are no easy answers, as is often the case with the most important things in life. Thankfully, God has been growing the SILS community over the past few years. Our registration for this year's event is the highest it's ever been. We have more than two dozen experts sharing their experiences. We continue to learn, discern, and yearn for God's ongoing redemptive action in the world.
