Trust and Share

Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation. (Psalm 146:3)



Here we are in the month of November. The election is over. I have yet to miss the barrage of television ads, the fliers in my mailbox, the telephone calls and surveys. I'm glad that's over...at least for a few months!

The hopes and dreams of many were riding on that election. Financial issues, moral and ethical issues and many of our religious freedoms hung in the balance with that election and are now teetering to a position that many of us are concerned about. Personally, my biggest concern is that our state and country are so equally divided.

The LORD has something to say about all this. He reminds us that our hopes and dreams, that is our trust, are not to rest in earthly rulers but in Him. The LORD, through the psalmist, compares and contrasts His trustworthy and eternal protection and provision with that of earthly rulers, who are short-lived and undependable. The influential and powerful of the world, even the best of them, cannot be our ultimate source of confidence. Like Adam, they too, are dust and will return to the ground from which they came (vs. 4).

It must be known by you that ultimately...ULTIMATELY, we as Christians are truly "blessed" just as the psalmist reminds us. *Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the LORD his God* (vs. 5).

We have the protecting power of the LORD, which can do infinitely more than any earthly ruler can do. He, as the psalmist preaches, raises the lowly, frees the prisoners and gives sight to the blind (vss. 7-9). Let some earthly ruler try to accomplish that!

You and I have come to know the dramatic way in which our LORD accomplished all of this through the earthly ministry of Jesus. His ministry reminds us that the greatest gifts are not natural food, physical healing, or political freedom (as candidates are quick to promise), but spiritual food that gives eternal life, healing that frees us from sin and death, and freedom which will endure forever.

The LORD provides all of these blessings for His people through His Son. For these blessings we praise the LORD now and forever. It's the reason we're here. The reason we do what we do. The reason we can rest in the fact that we do have some control over what WE can control and we'll let God do the rest.

The Lord provides. He is merciful and gracious, patient, loving and relentless in His pursuit of us and an infinity of other things. We can give thanks (Thanksgiving), we can celebrate the birth of our Savior (Christmas), we can celebrate another trip around the sun (or Son) this New Year, and we can celebrate His grace among us right here personally, at Good Shepherd, as we celebrate our 50th anniversary all of 2019! In fact, every day is a blessing. Every day we can see God at work in some way in our lives.

Share your trust in the Lord. He is still in control. Share your joy in the Lord, you have much to be joyful for. Rest in the Lord, He has promised you rest and has never broken a promise. In Him there is salvation.





God has once again blessed us with a successful craft fair and with many people who generously contributed their time and talent. It takes much effort to pull this off and it would not be possible without a dedicated group of crafters and bakers. Behind the scenes are those who cut wood, helped set up and take down tables, took yard signs, worked the day of the sale and came to the sale to



buy items. We even have friends and relatives of Good Shepherd members who have donated candy and crafts. Last but not least the youth group made candy for the sale. We hope they will continue to be involved.

This year we were able to add two additional rooms of items for sale and probably could have used a third room if it had been available. We are grateful to the teachers who used alternate rooms for Sunday School so we could leave everything set up for Sunday. Bakery items were less than previous years and hopefully we can increase it next year. It appeared that the bakery was the first room visited by many.

As for numbers, the attendance on Saturday was 800, which was 200 more than 2017. Sales totaled \$6305.25 on Saturday with an additional \$1100 on Sunday. Many favorable comments were heard from the public such as not charging an admission fee, all items are hand-crafted and all proceeds go to the church.

The craft group will not meet until after the holidays although I am sure many hands will not be idle during that time. It seems as if our brains work overtime looking for new ideas. Sometimes people don't like it when pastors talk about stewardship. For some, it hits too close to home. It is easier to talk about bad people in Washington, in history, or overseas than it is to think about what our daily life in Christ is supposed to look like – how we are supposed to love our neighbor.

The fact that we don't like hearing about stewardship certainly means we ought to face it. Here are a few simple and practical realities. God calls us to first-fruits, sacrificial giving. This means we should give off the top. We should set a percentage of our income as a deliberate gift for the work of the Church and give that first. We write the check to the Lord's work in the

Church before we pay the mortgage or pay for our medicine or pay for anything else.

We don't pay for all the stuff we need, and think we need, and then give from what is left over. That is the first-fruits idea. It is hard because we think we need all sorts of other things first. But that is the point of "sacrificial." Next, how could the starting point for Christian generosity and sacrifice really be anything less than a tithe – 10 percent? The ceremonial law of the Old Testament was never arbitrary. In the Old Testament, the Levites received this tithe so they could be full-time ministers.

Does the New Testament have a ministry that is larger or smaller? It is far larger: "Make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28:19). And we are still to have a full-time ministry: "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14).

So, if 10 percent was needed in the Old Testament, and we have a bigger mission need in the New Testament, how can we expect the Lord's work to be done on less than a tithe? First-fruits, sacrificial, generous giving – that's the way. We shouldn't fool ourselves into thinking that we've out-given God's goodness or that we've given plenty.

We might be tempted to think so but consider – no one in the Church has given plenty because no one has given all. No one has died for his sins. Only the sinless Son of God did that. Or, as St. Paul said, bringing the Good News of Jesus into the discussion of our giving to support the Lord's work in the Church: "I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:8-9).

As you can see, what the Bible commands about our stewardship can sting. It's law, and the law shows our sins. It calls us to repentance. The law is meant to expose and accuse for the sake of showing us Christ and His fulfillment of the law. If first-fruits, sacrificial giving has you squirming, that's the point.

In Mark's account of the feeding of the 5,000, Jesus took the disciples' five loaves and two fish and blessed them. It was nothing among so many, but, of course, it was plenty. Jesus makes something from nothing. Mark doesn't say that all the disciples gave Jesus all the bread they had. It is quite possible some of them held something back. But even if they did, that didn't stop Jesus from blessing them. Jesus makes something out of nothing.

He, who fed His people in the desert with Manna every morning, doesn't need their bread. But they need to give it. And what they give, however little it might be, however grudgingly they do so, He blesses it. He not only blesses those whom He feeds with it, but He blesses them, the givers – not just in that they wind up with (a basket full for each loaf) but that they learned to trust and rejoice in Him.

The Lord gives, and the Lord takes away. The Lord gives abundantly or asks us to fast. We do not know what will happen. Blessed be the Name of the Lord.

He does all things well and works all things together for good. The disciples don't give their bread to Jesus because it is a good investment. They give it because He is good, they love Him, and they trust Him. Let us go and do likewise.


