Um...yeah...we forgot. No, we didn't forget the name of the Lord our God. We didn't forget to extol His Name. We've still been speaking of God's glorious splendor and majesty. We've been meditating on God's wonderful works and proclaiming His great deeds. We've celebrated God's abundant goodness and we've joyfully sung of His righteousness...but we did forget something. Specifically, something very important to God's church that we call "Good Shepherd" here in Oshkosh.

It was never brought up at a meeting or a Bible study or in a conversation during fellowship time, because we all forgot. I forgot. You forgot. If I hadn't been rummaging through some old church directories looking for some other forgotten things (names & faces maybe?) we would've looked back next year and wondered why no one brought it up, why we didn't celebrate...

**Dear Good Shepherd family, your Church just turned 50 years old!** Fifty! A blink of an eye in God's time, but a long time for us mere mortals.

In **May of 1968** the South Wisconsin District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod extended a Divine Call to the Reverend T.J. Schneider to serve as Missionary-at-Large to the Southwest section of the City of Oshkosh. The call was accepted and Pastor Schneider arrived in June to begin his missionary responsibilities. On **September 1st**, **1968**, eighty-five (85) people participated in the initial service. At that time, 33 baptized souls and 20 communicant members were committed to the new mission. On **October 6th**, **1968**, Sunday School and bible classes for adults began on Sunday mornings.


Greetings,

It's September, and everything is in full swing again: back to school and back to church attendance after vacations and weekends away. And since everything is back into full swing, it's a perfect time to get back to basics, back to the foundation.

At the end of the first of his chapters on the virtue of faith in *Mere Christianity*, C.S. Lewis provides a helpful reminder, by way of analogy, for the foundation of stewardship. He wrote:

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So then, when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, "Daddy, give me six pence to buy you a birthday present." Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is six-pence to the good on the transaction. When a man has made these two discoveries God can really get to work. It is after this that real life begins. (128–129).

This is the first thing we are given to confess about stewardship, and it has to do with ownership. God owns everything, and we are simply managers — stewards — acting on His behalf. This is true not only of all that we have in this life (Deuteronomy 8:17–18), but also all that we are in this life (1 Corinthians 6:20).

The rest flows from here. Since we are stewards, or managers, of what belongs to God, entrusted to make use of it according to His will, there is an expectation of responsibility and accountability.

For the Lord said, "Everyone to whom much was given, of him much will be required, and from him to whom they entrusted much, they will demand the more" (Luke 12:48b).

And from this comes blessing and reward: "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master" (Matthew 25:21).

We have everything we need to support this body and life from our God's fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We have everything we need for our spiritual life also from His merciful hands.

On account of the sacrifice of His Son, our Lord Jesus, through the preaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments, we have the forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and everlasting salvation delivered to us with absolute certainty that it is ours — not as stewards but as sons (Galatians 4:1–7).

Let us then, as His own sons, press all that He gives to us into the service of His church and to His glory.

Julie and I have never been to a youth gathering, but when I think about 20,000 people gathered together in one place, not only from around the U.S. but across the world, worshiping collectively in heart and voice, I can't wait to experience it myself, to receive that foretaste of heaven that John describes in Revelation chapter 7, "After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, saying, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

As we all await and look forward to that day when we stand before the throne, what a gift it is to share in that foretaste that something like the youth gathering can provide. What a gift, as well, for our youth to receive that reminder that they are not alone in the struggle here on earth. Thousands of other believers their age across the country and globe are experiencing the same battles and temptations they face themselves. They will get a glimpse of that at the gathering. And each of those attending the gathering, youth and adult, will be reassured and comforted that the Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress as we dig deep into Psalm 46 and our real, present God.

So if you haven't already, take a moment to talk to one of the youth in our congregation. Personally encourage them to not miss out on this opportunity to attend the national youth gathering. Keep that dialogue going; encourage them to make the gathering their number one priority for next summer. Remind them just how much we need to take time to feed and nurture our faith, lest the world consume that time and our faith wanes.

The annual Craft/Bake Sale will be held Saturday November 17th. For anyone unfamiliar or new to Good Shepherd, this sale has been an annual event for almost 20 years, held on the first Saturday of deer hunting. Although the numbers of attendees has decreased since we first started, we are still blessed with an attendance of nearly 600 people and profits of \$6,000.

Beginning after Easter, the Craft Group meets every Wednesday to make items to be sold. Some members choose to make things at home and donate them for the sale. In recent years some members have even recruited family and friends to make something for the sale. Everyone is welcome to join us in crafting because there is always something to do, even for people who don't think they are "crafty." Originally the focus of this sale was more towards Christmas items but now it has expanded to anything as long as it is homemade.

The bake sale portion makes up a large part of this event. Over the years we have had enough donated baked goods, candies, and snacks to fill an entire classroom. You may want to consider making homemade goodies if you don't enjoy crafting.

# A Thought from Daniel Weiss and The Brushfires Foundation

In his excellent book, *Sexual Morality in a Christless World*, LCMS pastor Matthew Rueger details the sexualized society of the Roman world in the Apostolic age. What he describes is a violent and predatory culture where male Roman citizens essentially had a green light to fornicate with anyone and everyone who wasn't also a Roman citizen. Given that the Roman government ran 300+ brothels in Rome alone and that 1/6 of the population were slaves, this was a culture addicted to exploiting others.

A quick look at our own culture suggests we are not quite in the same position, but rapidly heading in the same direction. The #MeToo movement is revealing decades of hidden predatory behavior, mostly by men of privilege and power – just like in Rome. Hundreds of thousands of women, children, and men are enslaved in sex trafficking – just like in Rome. Hundreds of thousands of babies are aborted each year – just like in Rome, although Roman babies were born and abandoned to die alone in gutters. We celebrate graphic violence in TV and movies – just as they did in the Coliseum.

Rueger argues that Christian sexual ethics were not just foreign to the culture of the age – they were threatening. Christianity taught people to control their sexual desires and confine them to the marriage bed alone. The status of women was elevated in Christian teaching. Wives even had ownership over their husbands' bodies – something virtually unthinkable to the Romans. All Christians were taught to honor God with their bodies and to live sexually pure lives as a witness to the eternal love of God for all people. It's no wonder the early Christians were slandered and persecuted. If their beliefs took hold, Roman society could not long survive.

We see a similar fear of the Christian message today. Christians are called bigots, homophobes, haters, and worse because we hold to the inspired Word of God, especially concerning sexual ethics. Christians are now publicly ridiculed, attacked, and penalized by the law for holding fast to orthodox Christian teachings on sexuality.

In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Just like today, many of the early Christians struggled to lead lives of sexual integrity. The Epistles are full of exhortations to chaste living. In community and against strong odds, these Christians managed to swim up the open sewer of Roman sexual decadence. Like today, it must not have been easy. Yet, they did so with the help of Christ, and the strength, support, and encouragement of the believers around them.

A look at the headlines today shows that God's holy gift of sex, which is meant to be a blessing for all people, has become degraded and even weaponized. As much as the Romans did, our culture needs strong witnesses to the truth about sex and the greater truth about the Kingdom of God. We must be these witnesses, as well as support those among us who have fallen short – in our families, in our churches, and in our larger community. If we are honest—and believe the Bible – we know that all of us have fallen short in some way. There is no "us" and "them." There is only "us," the fallen and forgiven people of God.

Brushfires is dedicated to helping pastors, churches, and ordinary Christians live toward God's design for sexuality, and provide support, healing, and love to all who struggle with sexual brokenness in some way. I foresee a coming transformation of the Church from a field hospital that does triage on the wounded, to a teaching hospital where the well and the wounded together learn how to care for others, to a mobile clinic that goes out into the community with spiritual assistance, emotional support, and sexual healing for those who do not yet know Christ. Yet, this will happen only if we respond to God's call to care for the least among us.
